

From the Pastor's Desk

Here are 10 key points explaining the levels of sin—venial, serious, grave, and mortal—and the need for regular confession:

1. Sin is a rejection of God's love

Sin damages our relationship with God. While all sin is harmful, the Church distinguishes between **venial** and **mortal** (grave) sins based on their severity and effect on the soul.

2. Venial sin weakens, but does not break, our relationship with God

Venial sins are lesser sins that do **not destroy the state of grace** in the soul. Examples might include impatience, small lies, or unkind thoughts. They make us more vulnerable to committing mortal sin.

3. Mortal sin destroys sanctifying grace in the soul

Mortal sin is a grave violation of God's law, done with full knowledge and deliberate consent. It kills the life of grace and, if unrepented, leads to eternal separation from God.

4. Grave matter is the first condition for mortal sin

For a sin to be mortal, it must involve **grave matter**, such as breaking one of the Ten Commandments (e.g., murder, adultery, missing Sunday Mass without serious reason).

5. Serious sin and grave sin are often used interchangeably

"Grave sin" refers to the **objective seriousness** of the act, while "mortal sin" includes **grave matter plus full knowledge and full consent**. A serious sin may not always be mortal if the other conditions are lacking.

6. Regular confession is necessary for spiritual health

Even if we haven't committed a mortal sin, regular confession helps cleanse venial sins, strengthens the soul, and deepens humility and love for God.

7. Mortal sin must be confessed before receiving Communion

Anyone aware of having committed mortal sin must first receive the **Sacrament of Reconciliation**. Receiving the Eucharist in a state of mortal sin is itself a **sacrilege**.

8. Frequent confession helps form conscience

Confession is not only about forgiveness—it also **trains the soul** to discern right from wrong, to examine life honestly, and to strive for holiness.

9. Confession brings grace and healing

The Sacrament of Reconciliation restores sanctifying grace, reconciles us with the Church, and gives actual graces to resist future sin.

10. Jesus gave the Church the authority to forgive sins

In John 20:22-23, Jesus told the apostles: "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them..." Confession is not man-made—it is divine mercy administered through the Church.

St. Ignatius of Loyola, celebrated on his feast day of July 31, 2025, holds a pivotal place in Catholic culture as the founder of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) and a model of spiritual transformation. Born in 1491 in Spain, Ignatius transitioned from a life of soldierly ambition to one of profound devotion after a cannonball injury led to his conversion. His spiritual journey, marked by intense prayer and discernment, culminated in the creation of the Spiritual Exercises, a guide for deepening one's relationship with God through meditation and self-reflection. In Catholic communities worldwide, his feast day is an occasion to honor his legacy of faith, discipline, and missionary zeal, often celebrated with Masses, retreats, and reflections on his teachings, particularly in Jesuit-run institutions like schools, universities, and parishes.

In 2025, the feast of St. Ignatius will likely inspire Catholics to engage with his emphasis on discernment—the practice of making choices aligned with God's will. Jesuit communities and parishes may host events such as guided retreats or lectures exploring Ignatian spirituality, which emphasizes finding God in all things. The *Spiritual Exercises* remain a cornerstone, encouraging believers to reflect on their lives, recognize God's presence, and respond with purposeful action. This day also highlights Ignatius's role as a reformer during the Counter-Reformation, when the Jesuits became instrumental in revitalizing Catholic education and evangelization, countering Protestantism, and spreading the faith globally, from Europe to Asia and the Americas.

The cultural impact of St. Ignatius extends beyond liturgy, influencing Catholic education and social justice initiatives. In 2025, Jesuit organizations may use July 31 to promote their ongoing work in areas like poverty alleviation, environmental stewardship, and interfaith dialogue, reflecting Ignatius's call to serve others selflessly. Devotees might participate in service projects or Ignatian prayer sessions, often incorporating the Examen, a daily reflective practice he developed. His life inspires Catholics to pursue intellectual rigor and spiritual depth, blending contemplation with action. As a saint who transformed personal struggle into a global mission, St. Ignatius remains a powerful figure for Catholics seeking purpose and connection in a complex world.
